B. Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes

1. Course Description

This is an advanced course which introduces students to fundamentals of international arbitration based on their previous knowledge and skills acquired in commercial law and procedural law courses. Although it introduces new theoretical concepts to the students, it is largely taught from a practical perspective of a practicing lawyer and focuses on drafting of arbitration agreements, writing submissions in arbitration, research and pleading.

2. Course Main Objective

The main objective of this course is to introduce students to Arbitration and specifically Saudi Arbitration law and practice and how this compares with international law. The students shall acquire practical skills in arbitration, such as drafting of arbitration agreements, writing submissions in arbitration, research and pleading. It will examine regulation on the arbitration agreement, arbitral tribunal, its composition, and roles; jurisdiction, rules of procedure, evidence admissibility, interim measures, rules relating to arbitral award including its limits, form, applicable substantive laws, and challenges of the arbitration awards and its enforcement. The course also covers other Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR), such as mediation, conciliation, and negotiation. The course will also encompass interrelations between Shariah law and Arbitration Law.
